“Lingering Ash” Trees: A Story of Persistence and Propagation

When Emerald Ash Borer decimates an ash stand, individual trees occasionally survive. These “lingering” trees may hold the key to developing resistant strains of ash. Researchers with Cornell University and The Nature Conservancy’s Trees In Peril project in New York are looking into the possible mechanism for this resistance while propagating offspring from resistant trees found in the wild. The Role of Forest Management in Supporting American Marten Populations

American martens, endangered in Wisconsin, need complex, mature forests and deep snow cover to thrive. A partnership between the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission (GLIFWC), US Forest Service and UW-Madison has been awarded a \$690,000 research grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Federation to further study marten habitat preferences, and how land management and timber harvest practices can better support stable marten populations in the face of threats from climate change and habitat loss.
